English: Writing to Entertain and Inform

Key Vocabulary – Features Entertain		
Coordinating conjunctions	Using and to link two main ideas together. They pulled <u>and</u> pulled at the turnip to get it out.	
Exclamation marks	Especially in relation to speech to show emotion: what big eyes you have, grandma!	
Finger spaces between words	Appropriate spacing, depending on size of writing.	
Capital letters and full stops	To mark the beginning and end of sentences. Capital letters for the personal pronoun <i>I</i> and for names, places and days of the week.	

Key Vocabulary – Features Inform		
Coordinating conjunctions	Using and to link two main ideas together. Badgers sleep in the day <u>and</u> look for food at night.	
Question marks	Did you know?	
Finger spaces between words	Appropriate spacing, depending on size of writing.	
Capital letters and full stops	To mark the beginning and end of sentences. Capital letters for the personal pronoun <i>I</i> and for names, places and days of the week.


